

CITY NATIONAL ROCHDALE FUNDS SUMMARY PROXY VOTING POLICY

The Board of Trustees has adopted a Proxy Voting Policy with respect to voting proxies relating to portfolio securities held by the City National Rochdale Funds¹ (the "Policy"), pursuant to which the Board has delegated the responsibility for voting such proxies to City National Rochdale, LLC ("CNR, LLC") as a part of CNR, LLC's general management of the City National Rochdale Funds (each, a "Fund"), subject to the Board's continuing oversight. CNR, LLC, in accordance with the Policy, has further delegated the responsibility for voting proxies to its sub-advisers (together, the "Sub-Advisers").

A conflict of interest may be deemed to occur when CNR, LLC or the Sub-Advisers or one of their affiliated persons has a financial interest in a matter presented by a proxy to be voted on behalf of a Fund, which may compromise CNR, LLC's or the Sub-Adviser's independence of judgment and action in judging the proxy. If such a conflict occurs, CNR, LLC or the Sub- Adviser is required to submit a report to the Board of Trustees indicating the nature of the conflict of interest and how it was resolved.

¹ The City National Rochdale Funds refers to Equity Income Fund and U.S. Core Equity Fund (collectively, "Equity Funds"); Government Bond Fund, Corporate Bond Fund, California Tax-Exempt Bond Fund, Municipal High Income Fund, Intermediate Fixed Income Fund, and Fixed Income Opportunities Fund (collectively, "Bond Funds"), and the Government Money Market Fund.
